Celebrating the Earth with sustainable fashion

The Monterey Bay community came together to facilitate a clothing swap in honor of Earth Day on April 22. Marlow Vintage Company and the Surfrider Foundation partnered with Other Brother Beer Co. in Seaside to hold the event.

"Working with Other Brother is perfect because they let me do whatever I wanted to do today, and they were inspired by the Earth Day idea," said Amanda Marlow, the founder and CEO of Marlow Vintage.

Marlow is a personal stylist, vintage seller and collector. She has been in the fashion industry in various facets, and now focuses "on finding really great clothes that people have thrown out or discarded and restyling them into people's lives," she explained.

Her idea was to hold a clothing swap, where anyone from the community had the opportunity to donate their used clothes to the event and do some free shopping of all of the donated items. The event also consisted of a planting workshop for kids.

Rijk Zwaan, a seed supplier located in Salinas, donated crystal lettuce head seeds for the workshop. Local plant nursery Dirty Girl Plant Co. also participated in the Earth Day event by donating the soil for Rijk Zwaan's seeds.

Marlow explained that the team "made sure to reach out to all of the mom boards on Facebook and Instagram and went through schools and teachers in the community to get more kids involved" and educate children on fun and safe gardening practices.

Not only did Other Brother provide the venue, but the beer company also donated 15% of all beer sales of the day to the Surfrider Foundation.

When Marlowe reached out to Surfrider and asked them to join the event and be the main beneficiary, "I didn't hesitate to say yes. Especially when I found out that she wanted to do a clothing swap... It's the most environmentally friendly way to shop, as far as I'm concerned," shared Michelle Meeshy, the special events coordinator of the Surfrider Monterey chapter.

Surfrider is a national non profit environmental organization that was formed in Malibu, Calif. in 1984 when surfers were among the first to feel the harmful effects of polluted ocean water.

"Our local chapter works to protect the oceans, beaches and coastway of Monterey county," according to Meeshy. The Monterey chapter is completely volunteer-run and they accept members through donations.

The minimum membership donation used to be \$35, but has indefinitely been lowered to \$5 in an attempt to provide as many people as possible with the opportunity to serve and protect the treasured Monterey coast.

Surfirder will be holding their monthly mixer at Peter B's brewpub on May 18. "We're going to have a great raffle with a custom-made surfboard by a custom shaper. Portola hotel is also raffling off a two night stay," said Meeshy.

The foundation also holds a monthly beach clean up on the fourth Sunday of every month. The next one will be held on May 28 at Monterey Tides North and they are currently looking to fill the beach clean up captain position on the executive board. Sustainability is a vital part of the conversation surrounding climate change and how to keep our planet healthy. Shopping for second-hand clothes from vintage and thrift stores is a great way to save money while reducing your carbon footprint and keeping the earth clean from harmful pollutants.

"I try to get most of my clothes secondhand if possible. Mostly from an environmental, but also cost perspective, so I'm always interested in seeing what's available at events like this one," said Emily Basham, a local from Monterey who participated in the swap.

"We were having lunch inside and saw all the clothes so we had to come take a look. It's exciting to see people doing this," shared another local community member. "It's really helpful and good for the community."







Survey to address student concerns





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Remembering Lily, a former CSUMB student lost to suicide

Former California State University, Monterey Bay student Lily Lyman was an artist, poet, lover of fashion, and a friend who left an imprint on her campus community. She died by suicide in March after returning home to Sacramento.

Jay Funaro, Will Brooke and Grace Sjöberg, all secondyear students, spoke about who Lyman was and how her death impacted them.

"You would never guess. She was always smiling," said Funaro, a close friend of Lyman's. "Lily called me a week before she did it and texted me the day before. None of it would have led me to believe that she was about to commit (suicide) because she wasn't going to have anyone stop her."

Brooke reminisced about something that he remembered bringing joy and an outlet of creativity and expression to Lyman, which was her sense of style.

"Every time Lily went to the Starbucks in the [Otter Student Union], whatever (she) would order would match (her) outfit. And (she) always had a set of playing cards that also matched (her) outfit."

Lyman's poetry had celestial spiritual themes "about becoming the Earth, being a child of the moon, and becoming the soil," according to Funaro.

Sjöberg nodded in agreement and added, "Death brings life. Knowing that Lily is no longer in pain brings me neace."

Lyman was a part of the LGBTQ community and Brooke found a way to honor her by sharing skateboarding clips on his Instagram story to raise funds for the Sacramento LGBT Center.

"I'm LGBT and even before I knew that when I was younger, I had lots of friends who were and I felt for them when they would experience stuff," Brooke said. "Later on I figured out I was queer and started experiencing homophobia."

Skating has been an outlet for Brooke in his grieving process. "It was nice to feel like I was doing something

and it helps keep my mind off everything. I was pretty depressed at the time, so having some skate clips to edit and watching the number on the donation go up made me feel like I was doing something."

The fundraiser closed with \$130 donated by Brooke's followers.

Funaro said grief comes at them in waves. "There's shock, processing it yourself and then the depression phase where you lose function."

Sjöberg is figuring out how to bear the weight of her close friend's death on top of schoolwork and life in general. "I got an email from one of my professors saying that I'm failing a class and I was just like, 'OK.' And that's not me. Grieving is not really caring about anything."

Funaro said, "I thought that apathy is the worst depression that there is," but grieving changed their perspective.

When Funaro struggles with depressive thoughts, they allow themselves to feel them and find someone who they feel will know what to say. "When it hits me I text a couple of my other friends. People have been really good because you're sad about things and they remind you that what you're going through isn't normal and it's OK that you can't handle your life."

The three of them agree that supporting each other has helped them through this loss.

"It's nice to have a bunch of friends on campus who are going through the same thing so we can all be there for each other," said Brooke.

The CSUMB community should know "Lily was kind, never took sides and rarely held grudges," Funaro said, adding with a chuckle "And Lily was a narcissist."

According to Brooks, "She would carry around a little makeup mirror and stare at herself when we would hang out." They shared another laugh and Funaro added, "I would steal it from her and she would just take out

Lyman told Funaro that she wanted to go to the zoo for her 20th birthday, which just passed on April 13. The three friends went to the Oakland Zoo with her family and others who were close to her to celebrate her life.

Preparing for life after graduation can be challenging. With the help of the Preparing for an Interview event at California State University, Monterey Bay (CSUMB), attendees were able to get ready for the future with the help of the Center for Career Advising and Student Success on April.

Lauren Knottek, a student advisor within the Center for Career Advising Career and Student Success, started the workshop with an introduction to what is provided within the professional advising office, which included: resumes, cover letters and job/internship search strategies and more

She then started with her presentation about interviewing, brushing up on your resume and getting straight to the point/concise with certain information.

'Research says that employers spend around seven seconds on your resume, so keeping it as concise as possible would be the best," explained Knottek.

She then talked about formatting, which should be "clean, super easy to read, and around one to two pages."

From this, Knottek dove into interview skills where she pulled up slides about researching the company you're interviewing for, whether that be the location of the place you're interviewing for or doing research on what they do and how well they do it.

Knottek also recommended you should practice for your interview beforehand, where you rehearse the questions you may be asked and your answers.

According to Knottek, you should plan out your time accordingly and plan to arrive for interviews early.

"The purpose of an interview is an opportunity for you to showcase your skills and energy that they are looking for," she said.

It can also seem as though you're interviewing them too and interviews are an excellent opportunity for you to see if a job is the type of environment you want to spend a lot of your time in.

Knottek ended the workshop with answering any last minute questions.

CSUMB student Asul Garcia-Melendez asked "if we have never had any job experience, would we leave in our high school experience instead?"

She answered "I think you can absolutely draw on experiences in high school; what I like to tell students is to create a section of relevant coursework and ways in which you've showcased leadership or effective communication."

"You always want to thank the interviewer or the panel, I am a huge fan of thank you emails and it should be done within 24 hours," Knottek said. "You kind of want to keep it light and short, but absolutely send a thank you email."

Nintendo's Indie World showcase gives indie game developers a chance to spotlight their upcoming games. Nintendo most recently held one on Wednesday, April 19.

The 20-minute YouTube video showcased a variety of upcoming indie titles from both well-known studios and studios coming out with their debut game. In case you haven't had a chance to watch it, here's some of the highlights.

One of the earliest upcoming games announced was a sequel to "My Time at Portia," called "My Time at Sandrock." It made viewers wonder where certain things came from. For example in one scene, there's a part of a cave with multiple doors that all lead to different places.


The actors in this movie were great, especially the ones acting as children; they made you believe they were all either young teenagers or a small kid like Darla, whose superhero self was Meagan Goode.
