

### Monterey County Food Bank Ğives Free Produce to Otters

Kicking off the first week of the semester, the Monterey County Food Bank Produce Truck has made a return to campus to supply students with free fresh produce. On Aug. 23, California State University, Monterey Bay (CSUMB) students were able to stop by the produce truck to secure a bag of fresh produce.

Hosted by The CSUMB Basic Needs Initiative, the Monterey County Food Bank Produce Truck provides fresh, local, organic produce to students on a first come, first serve basis.

Located behind the Otter Express in parking lot 16, students are invited to get a bag of free produce from the Food Bank of Monterey County every second and fourth Wednesday of the month.

Student shopping takes place between 12 - 2 p.m. while staff shopping occurs from 1:30 - 2 p.m.

Some of the produce provided included strawberries, broccoli, carrots, cilantro, radishes, onions, apples, oranges, salad mixes, potatoes, and more.

Basic Needs Student Assistant, Jewelia Fletcher coordinated the event, checking-in students, directing them to the vendor truck, and encouraging them to visit the Basic Needs food pantry on campus.

The food pantry is located in the center of building 12 on campus and is open 9 a.m.- 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

"I started [playing drums] when I was 5 years old, and I'm 53 now," said drummer Shawn Medeiros; "I work with [Nick] fairly consistently, he called me and said, 'Hey I got a gig,' so here I am, happy to be here."

Both jazz-enjoyers and those indifferent to jazz had a seat at this event. One fourth-year student and regular listener of jazz, Sam Ulloa, said "I feel like jazz is the next big thing ... I really like soul ... I like swing too ... some of my favorites are probably Benny Goodman, I like Chet Baker, Billie Holiday's one of my favorites... I have playlists dedicated to them."

The students all seemed to be having a good time, dancing the night away and joining together at tables. "I think the event's going great, having this [be a] studentorganized [event] and seeing the result of it is pretty dope. I wish more student organizations utilized the spaces in this unique way," said Robin Fishman, a student organizer from Associated Students (AS).

When asked about future events, Fishman mentioned that "the semester is gonna be student club run, there's gonna be stuff from AS and Otter Media going on, just not as jam-packed as everything going on in [welcome back week]."

Events like these require lots of coordination and thought. The Men of Color Alliance put in the effort to provide this event for the students of CSUMB.

"I used to be the coordinator for the Men of Color Alliance, or one of them actually, and my role was helping secure the jazz musicians but also helping do a little of the back-end work. It couldn't have been done without the Men of Color Alliance," said Nevan Bell, a recent CSUMB graduate and organizer of this event.

"We have an effort on campus to try to make more traditions ... before I left, I wanted to put together something that students can remember. I wanna have students come in and enjoy something, and it is the 20s, you feel me? So a speakeasy is definitely needed."

The speakeasy was definitely a success, and was welcomed by dozens of students who were able to enjoy a

night of roaring fun.

The Undergraduate Research Opportunities Center (UROC) hosted its 10th annual summer research symposium on Aug. 10-11. Research presentations were seen throughout the Tanimura and Antle Family Memorial Library, and the College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences (CAHSS) building.

Poster presentations occupied all three floors of the library, while oral presentations were happening in the CAHSS building. There were many presenters at the symposium - 40 oral presentations, 83 poster presentations, and six virtual presentations via Zoom.

These research projects varied across academic disciplines; there were projects surrounding biology and chemistry, environmental science, psychology and even cinematic arts.

This research opportunity fosters variety and creativity, as seen in the presentations. There were many posters on plant soils, pesticides and microorganisms. On the flipside, there were posters which investigated habitdevelopment through Twitter (now known as X), or about the effectiveness of exercise accessories for enhancing muscle development.

"I did an oral presentation about preparing for a career in research, collaboration, and scientific writing through the lens of (my major)," said fourth-year psychology major Grace Quinowski.

"I love seeing the transformation in the students ... seeing their growth and them being able to narrow (interests) down ... that transformation is the best part," said Jessica Bautista, a UROC coordinator.

UROC is an opportunity for any student who is interested in gaining research experience, achieving professional development, or making connections with staff and other student researchers. Plus, research conducted through UROC is rewarded with money or course credit.

#### Who should apply?

All majors can apply. After establishing a relationship with a professor who works in your desired field of research, students can look to the UROC application page for necessary application materials.




#### When to apply?

Monterey Bay Union FC beat the Colorado Springs Switchbacks 2-1, ending a streak of nine games without a win on Aug. 26 at Cardinale Stadium on the California State University, Monterey Bay (CSUMB) campus. The Union was down by 1 going into the second half but caught up with two penalty kick goals back to back.

The match was completely sold out filling 6000 seats in Cardinale Stadium. Every athletics team from CSUMB came to support Union for their back-to-school night game. "I've been observing the people that play in my position and kind of using them to get better," said Tariq Alabi, a third-year player on CSUMB's men's soccer team.

In July the Switchbacks beat the Union 4-0 in an away game and MBFC gritted their way through an intense game to come out on top. The Switchbacks scored the first goal of the game in the second half but ultimately lost because of their excessive fouls and ended up with three red cards. Before the Union scored their second goal, a fight broke out and one of the Switchbacks defenders was ejected from the game.

When the opposing team is having a long possession of the ball, "we try to get the ball back and put them under pressure," said Christian Volesky, center-forward.

Union will next play an away game against El Paso Locomotive FC on Saturday, Sept. 2.

The gym has a basketball court where you can rent basketballs or volleyballs, a weight room, and a cardio room.
